



Techniques for Effective Alcohol Management

State information: Alberta

General Regulations

Legal age to Consume Alcohol: 18. Minors may consume or be provided liquor by an adult in a "private residence" only.

Legal age to Pour, Sell or Serve Alcohol: 18

Limit for Driving While Intoxicated: .08

Dram Shop Liability Laws: No

Maximum Alcohol per Drink: Not regulated

Number of Drinks One Can Serve at One Time: Not regulated

Server Training

Alberta does not have any laws regulating server training. Training seminars are available from the province on topics including legal responsibilities and liability. The seminars last approximately two hours and are free of charge.

Acceptable Forms of ID

Alberta or other province Operator's License

Other comparable form of identification from other jurisdictions

ID Confiscation

Not regulated.

Policies Regarding Minors

It is unlawful to serve or sell alcohol to anyone under the age of 18. Minors are permitted in all premises except: premises with VLT's; retail liquor stores unless accompanied by a parent; adult premises such as lounges or taverns.

Non-Alcoholic Beer and Wine

Not regulated.

Alcohol Liability

All licensees are responsible for ensuring service is not provided to minors, intoxicated persons, or after legal hours, etc. Penalties may be issued by the Commission with additional police charges and court penalties also assessed. First offense penalties for serving a minor may result in a 5 to 7 day suspension of the liquor license and/or up to \$5,000 fine. Selling alcohol to an apparently intoxicated person may result in a suspension of 1 to 3 days and/or a fine of up to \$1,000.
